Some recently completed park upgrades include:

- > Ison Park pump track installed and new shelter, with a new car park coming next
- > Crystal Brook Park new playground installed
- > Wearing Park playground equipment upgrade
- > Spring Mountain Reserve car park upgrade

- > Leaf Park new barbecue and bikeway improvements
- > Logan West Parklands Disc Golf with final plans and funding secured ready to start, hopefully before Christmas
- > Colville Park playground upgrade scheduled in 2024.

All the projects above have been in addition to upgrades at:

- > Richard Wilson Park toilet install
- > Settlers Park new playground equipment
- > Lavelle Lagoon Park major playground embellishment
- > Homestead Park toilet install
- > Punter Park new playground equipment
- > Teviot Park addition of digger.

Building footpaths on major roads that connect suburb to suburb, and people to parks and shops, has been my motivation over the last few years. Recently, I have been able to add more footpaths to the network. Some major footpath works finished or about to commence since my last newsletter are:

- > Crest Road recently completed
- > Bushman Drive
 recently completed
- Harvest Rise West Service Road
 construction has begun
- > Pub Lane Equestrian Drive to Dungaree will begin shortly.

When future major road upgrades are planned, I am advocating for footpaths and active transport lanes to be included, where possible.

Road upgrades coming!

The year 2024 will mark a significant turning point for Division 11, with major road upgrades planned. With the population increasing in Division 11, we are investing in our road network to make sure it remains fit for purpose.

We are planning road upgrades in Greenbank to improve connectivity with surrounding areas.

Initial widening works on Teviot Road will be carried out at the Leanne Court intersection in 2024.

The exact position of the road alignment of Goodna Road and New Beith Road, that will bypass the Greenbank State School to reduce congestion and create a safer road for motorists, is expected to be known by late 2023 or in early 2024.

In late October 2023, construction works commenced on Teviot Road, from Bushman Drive to Homestead Drive in Flagstone, including intersection upgrades. These upgrades will deliver improved road safety, more reliable travel times and reduce congestion.

Future planned road upgrades also include New Beith Road, Teviot Road and Cusack Lane intersection, Scott Lane and Teviot Road intersection.

These upgrades promise to transform Division 11 into a more accessible and well-connected community.



Middle Green gets an upgrade

A recent report to Council proposed an upgrade to the toilets, including appropriate disabled toilet access and entry points, at Middle Green. I know this is long overdue and, after much discussion, my fellow Councillors supported the upgrade to proceed. This will make a world of difference to residents and their families who visit and enjoy Middle Green.

For those new to the area, Middle Green is at 720–768 Middle Road, Greenbank. It is home to the Greenbank Raiders Rugby League Club and many more community groups.



Council has been on the look-out for new ways to continue the of markers after the current line-up became full. Early next year, new flood markers to mark the 2022 flood event will be installed. So, keep an eye for that when driving past. They will display the flood level using lights. Keep an eye on the park as construction starts early October.
