Exciting park upgrades

With summer fast approaching, Councillor Tim Frazer and Logan City Council are pleased to announce upgrades to Division 7 parks.

Zorina Park at Browns Plains now sports a new play structure with slides, double bay swing with toddler seat, basket swing, timber log steppers and balance beams. For those a little less active, you can watch the action from the new shelter and seating. There is also a drinking fountain with a dog bowl for your 4-legged friends.

If you're a Hillcrest resident, you may have seen the Sweetgum Park upgrades. The main shelter looks great with new seating and a picnic table with a double barbecue – perfect for al fresco dining. A new drinking foundation and bin enclosures complete the upgrade. New accessible footpaths have also been built, along with a replanted garden bed on Sweetgum Street. These footpaths make it easier than ever to get to the new facilities.

The new single cubicle toilet, decorated with a colourful mural, is also in the works. The toilet will be locked until the final plumbing connection is complete.

'It is wonderful to finally see the great work of Council staff come to fruition,' Councillor Frazer says.

'This upgrade will be an asset to the community for many years to come.'

Curbing the need for suburban speed

Councillor Frazer says speeding and rat running are 2 of the main issues raised with his office.

Logan City Council is committed to making roads safer for all by assessing when traffic calming devices are necessary through traffic counts. These counts measure the number of vehicles on a particular road and the direction and average speed at which they are travelling.

If the counts show excessive use by non-locals, Council will consult with locals around potentially installing speed platforms. Recently, counts were carried out in Browns Plains, resulting in a total of 5 speed platforms being installed: 2 in Acacia Street and 3 in Fern Street.

Council will continue to monitor the performance of these treatments and consider further measures if needed.

New upgrade for family-friendly fun

Charlotte Zammit, an 8-year-old from Browns Plains, is a young lady with great ideas.

Charlotte wrote to Councillor Frazer last year and requested a meeting to discuss Zorina Park.

Charlotte, who frequently visits the park with her grandmother, Lindel, felt the park needed some upgrades and wanted to share her thoughts with Councillor Frazer.

After meeting with Charlotte, Councillor Frazer and Council's Parks branch took her suggestions on board and came up with a plan for asset renewal.

The playground has now been refreshed and is better suited for all users.

'It was nice of Councillor Frazer to listen to my concerns and now the community has a nice park to play in - thank you to Logan City Council and Councillor Frazer,' Charlotte says.

Councillor Frazer responded in kind, thanking Charlotte for her feedback and hopes she and the local children will enjoy playing in the park for years to come.

There's something for everyone with classes held throughout the week for watercolour, glass fusing, clay sculpting, scrapbooking and more.


To celebrate this significant milestone, the LWCASA fired up the grill for a free barbecue and set up an art market. There were also free art activities for kids.
