Be storm prepared this summer

Severe weather is a natural part of living in the City of Logan's subtropical climate.

I experienced this firsthand when my own home in Slacks Creek went under during the 2022 floods.

Every year, Logan experiences severe weather and it's important for us all to take the time to prepare our families, pets and property.

The following tips offer some advice on what you can do now to help you stay safe during and after a severe weather event.

- > Download the app: lccqld.com/ logan-early-warning.
- Trim tree branches to be clear of your house and mow your grass regularly.
- If you can do so safely, clean your roof, gutters and downpipes and check any skylights.
- > Secure outdoor items such as

- furniture, toys and equipment when a storm is approaching.
- > My personal tip is to get to know others on your street.

During the 2022 flood, my neighbours were incredible. They helped with sandbags, brought me food and coffees by boat, then they helped with the clean-up. I don't know how I would've made it through that time without them.

To be prepared for all forms of severe weather including bushfires, floods and heatwaves, prepare an emergency kit to include:

- Bottled water (enough for 3 days per person)
- Non-perishable food items (enough for 3 days per person) and can opener
- > First-aid kit
- > Essential medications and prescriptions

- > Baby supplies if needed
- > Torch
- > Battery operated radio with spare batteries
- Important documents or important files on a USB
- > Toiletries and hand sanitiser
- > Extra clothes and blankets
- > Pet food if needed

I've got some exciting news for our city. We've just announced an amazing new project in Logan – and the Expressions of

Interest for a company to build it are officially open.

If you haven't already heard about the Logan Indoor Sports Centre, it's a multipurpose indoor sports facility that our growing city needs, which is being built to an Olympic standard so that it can be used if needed when the Games arrive in 2032.

It's exactly what our fast-growing city needs, because facilities like this inspire young people to reach for the stars. This venue can host a range of sports, para sports and large-scale events, and host 7,000 people inside.

Three levels of government have come together to make this happen. At a cost of \$142 million dollars, it's being jointly funded by the Australian and Queensland governments, with Council providing the land.

The facility will be owned and operated by Logan City Council and is sure to become a beacon for state, national and international sports and events. It's going to be built where the old PCYC is – close to the Logan Entertainment Centre as a great addition to our fantastic events hub.

I'm grateful to local state MPs Linus Power and Cameron Dick, as well as Federal Treasurer Jim Chalmers and Minister for Infrastructure Catherine King, for coming along to the announcement in Logan Central. Hats off to them for recognising the limitless potential of Logan.

Investment like this is exactly what we need to create a brighter future for our kids. With 9 indoor courts across 2 halls, this will leave a legacy from the 2032 Brisbane Olympic and Paralympic Games to benefit our community for decades to come.

Back then, while it was a functional facility filled with highly capable staff, it couldn't be ignored that it was a collection of demountable buildings older than me.

This time, however, I was impressed to see what a transformation has occurred in the facility.

A lot of planning went into the design of the new 2.5-hectare, state-of-the-art centre which has around 100 staff.

The upgrade's focus has been on making smoother processes, leading to happier people and animals.

Part of my visit was to see the

cute kitties and to check out their new digs. I was pleased to observe calm cats, each with a space of their own.

These 'cat condos' are airconditioned and ventilated. They are cleverly designed to be comfortable, to reduce stress and very importantly, help limit the spread of any infections and illnesses.

There's also a lovely environment where families can meet and get to know prospective pets.

In the canine section, I got to meet an energetic but sweet dog, Hero. He was enjoying a walk and learning some behavioural skills in preparation for finding a new home.

I also met a sweary cockatoo, but he was very polite to me.

All the animals I saw get a five-star experience in the AMC, but they'd much prefer to find their forever homes in our community.

Connecting with our Creek, naturally

The Mabel Park Waterway Naturalisation project is underway to reconnect Slacks Creek to the natural environment and the community.

This revegetation project aims to improve habitat quality for native aquatic and land species, as well as establishing community connections with the waterway.

Around 600 metres of Council-owned land, including a 200-metre concrete-lined channel will be restored to a more natural state.

Weed control will also be undertaken with native plants and habitat features added. The project is funded by Council and the Australian Government.
