I recently met with our Logan Local Disaster Management leaders to discuss strategies and resources that help residents prepare for natural disasters such as floods, bushfires, heatwaves and severe storms.

With storm season now underway, I'd like to highlight some things that residents can do to prepare.

I encourage you to visit the 'Disasters and Emergencies' page on Logan City Council's website for valuable resources that can assist preparing your family and pets for whatever severe weather event might be just around the corner.

Please scan the QR code below to go direct to Council's Disaster Dashboard, which includes live information from flood watch cameras, system outages, road hazards and more.

Remember, being ready to respond to and recover from natural disasters is a shared responsibility.

Mayor's message



I've got some exciting news for our city. We've just announced an amazing new project in Logan – and the

Expressions of Interest for a company to build it are officially open.

If you haven't already heard about the Logan Indoor Sports Centre, it's a multi-purpose indoor sports facility that our growing city needs, which is being built to an Olympic standard so that it can be used if needed when the Games arrive in 2032.

It's exactly what our fast-growing city needs, because facilities like this inspire young people to reach for the stars. This venue can host a range of sports, para sports and large-scale events, and host 7,000 people inside.

Three levels of government have come together to make this happen. At a cost of \$142 million dollars, it's being jointly funded by the Australian and Queensland governments, with Council providing the land.

The facility will be owned and operated by Logan City Council and is sure to become a beacon for state, national and international sports and events. It's going to be built where the old PCYC is – close to the Logan Entertainment Centre as a great addition to our fantastic events hub.

I'm grateful to local state MPs Linus Power and Cameron Dick, as well as Federal Treasurer Jim Chalmers and Minister for Infrastructure Catherine King, for coming along to the announcement in Logan Central. Hats off to them for recognising the limitless potential of Logan.

Investment like this is exactly what we need to create a brighter future for our kids. With 9 indoor courts across 2 halls, this will leave a legacy from the 2032 Brisbane Olympic and Paralympic Games to benefit our community for decades to come.
