Pickleball trend ready to take off

Mount Warren Park Sports and Fitness Centre will soon be ready to welcome pickleball players of all ages and skill levels.

Pickleball is a sports trend that has taken off around the world.

The game blends elements of tennis, table tennis and badminton. It is played with a large, short-handle racquet and a fluted ball that is slower moving and easier to hit than a tennis ball.

The pickleball net is also lower than in tennis.

Line markings for pickleball will be added to the centre's 4 timber courts over the Christmas shutdown, funded by the Division 12 Local Infrastructure Program.

Pickleball sessions will then be available every day from 8:30 am to 10:30 am. Just bring your own water bottle and towel.

Mount Warren Sports and Fitness Centre caters for a range of indoor sports including basketball, volleyball, netball, futsal, roller skating and badminton.

The facility has a gym, onsite cafe, meeting room, accessible change room facilities and free parking.

Mount Warren Sports and Fitness Centre is at 2 Milne Street, Mount Warren Park.

Mayor's message



We all live in Logan for a reason – whether it's backyards and big dreams, great parks and schools, community spirit or affordability.

Council works with the community to protect what we love and transform areas that still need work.

We've wrapped up 9 weeks of community consultation on Logan Plan – the blueprint for where homes, jobs, industry and community facilities go, and how we keep our community spirit as we grow.

You asked us to cut red tape and make it easier to buy a home, so we've proposed terrace housing, giving first-home buyers and downsizers more options. We also flagged ecotourism opportunities and practical ways to boost our nighttime economy, so our suburbs feel safe and welcoming after dark.

We heard your concerns about flood mapping loud and clear. Your Councillors and I are working with staff on solutions based on your feedback. This is long-term policy, so we need to get it right before the flood maps become permanent. We're starting with changes to the flood portal, and also want to change policies and improve the mapping.

Council will consider every submission, report back to Councillors, and provide a response to every submission through the *Logan Plan - Public Consultation Report 2025*. Parts of the draft may be revised, then the State Government will review it. If approved, Logan Plan is expected to come into effect in late 2026.

Thank you to all who had a say. You're helping shape the city our kids will inherit. If you didn't have a chance to make a submission, I am always open to hearing your ideas and suggestions.


Council will keep refining Logan Plan and our vision for the next 50 years with your help. Logan's future is bright because we're building it together.

Avoid a leak, take a peek!

1. Turn off all taps and water-using appliances in the property.
2. Is there any movement in the red digits or dials of your water meter? Any movement may indicate a leak.
3. To check – read your meter and record the number, keep your taps and water using appliances off for one hour. Read your meter again, record the second reading. If the reading has changed, this may indicate a leak. We suggest contacting a registered plumber to investigate further.
