As well as being a former City of Logan Mayor (2006-2008) and the namesake for the gallery at the Logan Progress Hall, Graham was instrumental in getting the association off the ground.

Many who have followed the association's journey would know that the first lease at their hall in Loganlea was signed for just \$5.

It was the start of something special for this amazing group who still call

Division 6 home. And look how far they have come.

The association now has more than 400 members on its books.

Fast-forward 2 decades from when they began and Graham was back at the association's Coral Street headquarters for a party.

Artists young and old had a fantastic day. Kids had a ball painting rocks and using the jumping castle, while art exhibitions, demonstrations and coffee kept the adults entertained.

I'm the latest in a long line of Divisional councillors to happily support the association, which has

received significant Council funding over the years.

In 2022, a new shed was installed to allow kiln firing to take place without the need for more extraction fans.

That same year, the association lost mowing equipment in a flood, and Council helped with funding to buy a ride-on mower and whipper snipper.

It's all great history with an undying devotion to art. Here's to the next 20 years!

Nets upgrade in time for summer of cricket

A resident came to me with the idea of installing cricket nets. When we went to community consultation, 76 per cent of respondents said they would use the nets.

Sometime in the future, you never know – maybe a youngster from Division 6 could go on to wear the Baggy Green for Australia after honing their skills in Sturdee Park.

Local parks get heaps of fun new features

Kids of all ages will find something to enjoy from new features at 2 upgraded parks in Loganlea.

Evergreen Park and Lyrebird Park have been given some much-needed love, just in time for the warmer months.

Little train lovers are in for a treat at Lyrebird Park. New features include a train rocker and station to get future drivers excited.

There's also a spinning seesaw, swing and sand digger.

Evergreen Park will challenge the littlies and the bigger kids, too. There's a junior slide and multi-play structure, as well as a more challenging rope climb.

I have visited both parks to check out new additions for myself. They look great!

Lyrebird Park is on Lyrebird Street, just off Loganlea Road.

To get to Evergreen Park, head down Kingston Road and turn into Evergreen Avenue. Follow it around the sharp right-hand bend and the park is on your left.

New speed limit makes Castile Crescent safer

Important road safety upgrades are continuing across parts of Division 6.

Castile Crescent at Edens Landing now has a new speed limit of 50 kilometres per hour.

If you are driving in that part of Division 6, please be aware as police may be in the area to ensure drivers adhere to the new limit.

Another change to enhance road safety in the Division is the installation of a wombat crossing outside the Edens Landing Shopping Centre.

The raised crossing slows down drivers and boosts pedestrian safety.

Mayor's message



We all live in Logan for a reason – whether it's backyards and big dreams, great parks and schools, community spirit or affordability.

Council works with the community to protect what we love and transform areas that still need work.

We've wrapped up 9 weeks of community consultation on Logan Plan – the blueprint for where homes, jobs, industry and community facilities go, and how we keep our community spirit as we grow.

You asked us to cut red tape and make it easier to buy a home, so we've proposed terrace housing, giving first-home buyers and downsizers more options. We also flagged ecotourism opportunities and practical ways to boost our nighttime economy, so our suburbs feel safe and welcoming after dark.

We heard your concerns about flood mapping loud and clear. Your Councillors and I are working with staff on solutions based on your feedback. This is long-term policy, so we need to get it right before the flood maps become permanent. We're starting with changes to the flood portal, and also want to change policies and improve the mapping.

Council will consider every submission, report back to Councillors, and provide a response to every submission through the *Logan Plan - Public Consultation Report 2025*. Parts of the draft may be revised, then the State Government will review it. If approved, Logan Plan is expected to come into effect in late 2026.

Thank you to all who had a say. You're helping shape the city our kids will inherit. If you didn't have a chance to make a submission, I am always open to hearing your ideas and suggestions.


Council will keep refining Logan Plan and our vision for the next 50 years with your help. Logan's future is bright because we're building it together.

Avoid a leak, take a peek!

1. Turn off all taps and water-using appliances in the property.
2. Is there any movement in the red digits or dials of your water meter? Any movement may indicate a leak.
3. To check – read your meter and record the number, keep your taps and water using appliances off for one hour. Read your meter again, record the second reading. If the reading has changed, this may indicate a leak. We suggest contacting a registered plumber to investigate further.
